The delegation from the GSA who joined the Presidency during the visit to Singapore, included Mr. Hudu Mogtari, Board Chairman, Mr. Clifford Frimpong, Deputy Director-General (CAS), and Mr. Emmanuel Asare, Head of Technical Coordination Services (TCS) Department.

Bilateral discussions were also held on how both

organisations can leverage each other’s expertise to achieve shared goals.

GSA, Halal Certification Ghana Discuss Potential Collaboration

On Wednesday, August 27, 2025, a delegation from the Bureau of Halal Certification Ghana (BHC-Ghana), Halal Development Corporation (HDC) Malaysia and senior officials of the GSA led by Mr. Prince I.K Arthur, met to discuss a potential partnership, particularly in aligning Halal standards with the national quality infrastructure and building institutional partnerships to strengthen Halal compliance, testing and certification in Ghana.

The meeting also discussed Ghana's efforts toward attaining international Halal recognition through Jakim Malaysia.

The BHC-Ghana and HDC delegation included Sheik Salman Mohammed Alhassan, BHC-Ghana Board Chair; Samudeen Yusif, BHC-Ghana Executive Director; Abdul Rahim Mohammed, BHC-Ghana Finance Director; Mohd Zamulud Bin Awang Kechik, Chief of Commerce, HDC; Fatin Nutashira Bint Mohd Ashraf, also from HDC, among other executives from BHC-Ghana.

The GSA officials that met the delegation included Mr. Prince Arthur, Director of Metrology; Ms. Joyce Okoree, Director of Certification; Dr. Charles Kuranchie, Head of

Product Certification; Ms. Dzienyo Akafia, Head of Systems Certification; Ms. Charlotte Hebedzi, and Mr. Emmanuel Adjetey, both from the Certification Directorate and Mr. Fotwe Afful, from the Public Relations (PR) Department.

Mr. Arthur, who chaired the meeting, expressed the GSA's excitement of meeting the delegation and noted that the Authority's doors were opened for collaboration with other agencies, assuring the delegation of GSA's support and commitment once the collaboration begins in full force.

Sheik Alhassan, on his part, said that the delegation made it a point to meet with the GSA because it was the recognised body for standardisation in Ghana and in order for the certification to succeed, it was important they aligned with the standards.

“We are here to discuss collaboration opportunities. We would like to further collaborate on the development of Halal standards, code of practices or guidelines and other testing and certification processes to enable Ghana gain global recognition in Halal Certification,” he said.

He further noted that Halal Certification was a trillion dollar industry and if Ghana took full advantage, the nation would reap its benefit.

“Halal certification’s value proposition is a huge one. In Africa, we have about 5 countries being involved in it so if Ghana subscribes fully to it, it will open up the country to trading with many other

countries and will inure to the benefit of the country’s economy,” he noted.

Mr. Kechik emphasised that it was not only Muslim countries that benefit from the Halal certification, adding that Brazil, for instance, is the largest producer of Halal poultry and Ghana could do same with products like cocoa, cashew, among others.

Ms. Okoree, during the meeting, told the team to share with GSA, documents and other things they had so that they could look at it together. She appealed for support in the development of the standards and noted that once there’s a standard in place they could move on to developing a scheme for the certification.

Halal certification is a process that verifies a product, or service complies with Islamic law (Sharia), ensuring it is permissible for Muslims to consume or use. It involves checking for forbidden ingredients like pork and alcohol, verifying that animals were slaughtered correctly, and confirming that all materials and processes avoid contact with impurities.

This voluntary certification is recognised internationally and is essential for businesses aiming to sell to the Muslim market by assuring consumers of adherence to their religious requirements.

GSA Showcases Trade Facilitation Role at Global Expo/Tourism Fair and CII India–Africa Business Conclave

The GSA has participated in the just-ended Global Expo/Tourism Fair and the 20th CII India–Africa Business Conclave, both held in India, between August 21 and 30, 2025.

Participation in the Global Expo/Tourism Fair

The Global Expo/Tourism Fair, organised by the South Gujarat Chamber of Commerce and Industry (SGCCI), brought together leading Indian businesses

and investors eager to explore trade and investment opportunities in Ghana and across Africa.

Participating businesses cut across diverse sectors, including textiles and garments, electronics, agro-processing, lubricants, green energy projects, and automobile products.

At the GSA exhibition stand, companies unfamiliar with the Ghanaian business environment, were guided through detailed procedures on trade facilitation, importation requirements,

conformity assessment, and the critical role of standards and quality assurance in accessing Ghana's market. This engagement was particularly important in assuring potential investors of Ghana's robust quality infrastructure.

The Expo was chaired by the Vice President of Zimbabwe, Hon. Constantino Chiwenga, who underscored the importance of Africa–India trade relations in his opening remarks.



Following the fair, GSA was hosted at the SGCCI headquarters, where Mr. Paresh Bhatt, CEO and Strategist for International Business, emphasised the keen interest of Indian businesses in investing in Ghana. Discussions centred on:

- Importation procedures and mandatory product testing at GSA laboratories.
- The upcoming Import Certification Scheme, which will streamline processes for exporters and importers.
- Opportunities for capacity building of GSA technical and support staff in collaboration with Indian manufacturers and research institutions.

Mr. Bhatt reaffirmed SGCCI's commitment, stating, "We are grateful to have you here to guide our businesses in

trading with Ghana. We see Ghana as a gateway to Africa."

As part of SGCCI's hospitality, the GSA delegation was taken on factory visits to companies engaged in textile production, lubricant manufacturing, car battery assembly, and agro-processing. These visits provided first-hand insight into production lines that could potentially be replicated or extended to Ghana.

Participation in the 20th CII India–Africa Business Conclave

The GSA also took part in the CII India–Africa Business Conclave, held in New Delhi from August 27–29, 2025, under the theme: "Co-creating a Shared Future."

The delegation received strong diplomatic support from Mr. Julius Oteng, Acting High Commissioner of Ghana to India, and Air Commodore George Kweku Arko-Dadzie, Head of Defence at the Ghana High Commission in India.

The three-day conference brought together policymakers, business leaders, and investors from across Africa, including

delegations from South Africa, Nigeria, Mauritius, Uganda, Cameroon, Chad, Ethiopia, Zimbabwe, Burkina Faso, Guinea, Mali, Namibia, and The Gambia.

Ghana played a visible role in three major panel discussions which took place on the second day of the event.

The first discussion was on the topic *'Harnessing Critical Minerals for Sustainable Future'* – Ghana was represented on the panel by Hon. Joseph Nelson, Western Regional Minister. The panel discussion focused on the pivotal role of critical minerals in advancing sustainability. It was emphasised that minerals such as lithium, cobalt, nickel, and rare earth elements were essential for clean energy technologies and advanced manufacturing, including renewable energy systems and electric vehicles.

Hon. Nelson, in his remarks, highlighted that while these resources held great promise, their extraction posed environmental, geopolitical, and ethical challenges. Addressing these challenges through innovative practices, strong regulatory frameworks, and international cooperation, were identified as crucial for long-term sustainability.

The discussions further underscored India's growing focus on Africa's critical minerals sector as part of its strategy to secure essential resources. It was noted that India's engagement in this area supported its electric vehicle (EV) industry, contributed to the global clean energy transition, and fostered sustainable development and economic growth for both Africa and India.

The second panel discussion, which Ghana took part, was on *'Driving Africa's Future with Affordable and Sustainable Mobility Solutions'*, and was represented by Hon. Sampson Ahi, Deputy Minister of Trade, Agribusiness and Industry.

The session on Africa's Mobility Sector and Electric Vehicle (EV) Collaboration emphasised that the continent's mobility sector was poised for significant expansion. Panellists observed that despite this potential, high costs, limited charging infrastructure, and the absence of enabling policies, posed considerable challenges to scaling up.

India's experience was presented as a scalable model for Africa. It was highlighted that India's electric two-wheeler segment had grown by 36% in 2023, supported by strong national initiatives such as the FAME-II scheme and robust battery-swapping networks. India was also making strategic investments in lithium sourcing and cell manufacturing, areas that were identified as ripe for Indo-African collaboration.

The discussions focused on collaborative models for EV manufacturing, affordable transport innovations, urban logistics, and the adoption of sustainable fuels such as CNG and ethanol blends.

Speaking on behalf of the Ghanaian delegation, Hon. Ahi, remarked: "Africa's future in mobility depends on how quickly we can adopt sustainable and affordable transport solutions. India's

example shows us that with the right policies and investment in critical minerals, Africa too can lead in EV adoption and localised manufacturing. Ghana stands ready to partner in creating an enabling ecosystem for this transition.”

The third panel discussion that Ghana participated in was on the topic ‘Advancing the Next Generation for Equitable Development of Human Capital’ and was represented by Hon. Dr. Abdul-Rashid Hassan Pelpuo, Minister of Labour, Jobs and Employment. The session on Africa’s Youthful Population and Workforce Development highlighted that Africa’s young demographic had presented a significant opportunity to drive long-term growth and innovation. Panellists emphasised, however, that there had remained an urgent need to scale up education, skills training, and

entrepreneurship support across the continent.

The discussion drew on insights from the CII Centers of Excellence and explored avenues for India–Africa collaboration in developing workforce readiness, vocational training systems, digital literacy, and leadership development.

The focus was on building inclusive ecosystems that had equipped young people with the tools and opportunities needed to thrive in an evolving global economy.

Speaking on behalf of Ghana, Hon. Pelpuo stated that “Africa’s youthful population is our greatest asset, but only if we prepare them with the right skills and opportunities. Partnerships with India in vocational training, digital literacy, and entrepreneurship can help us unlock this potential and build a workforce that

is globally competitive, yet locally impactful.”

The Confederation of Indian Industry (CII), in collaboration with the Ministry of External Affairs and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India, launched the India–Africa Conclave on Partnership in 2005. Since its inception, it has evolved into one of the most prominent platforms for dialogue and collaboration between Africa and India. To date, it has hosted over 10,000 African and 8,500 Indian delegates, including 500+ senior ministers and several African Heads of State.

The 20th edition of the Conclave provided a strategic platform for advancing Africa’s development agenda while highlighting the India–Africa partnership’s role in integrating regional and global value chains. Key

sectors highlighted included Agriculture and Food Processing, Defence, Digital Partnerships, Financial Services, Healthcare and Pharmaceuticals, Infrastructure, Power and Energy,

Quality Ecosystems, and Capacity Development.

In addition to business conferences, B2B meetings, and exhibitions, this year's

event introduced product launches showcasing the "AAA" approach of Indian businesses to Africa: Affordable, Adaptable, and Appropriate.

The Deputy Director-General (CAS) of GSA, Mr. Clifford Frimpong, has been selected to serve on the newly reconstituted Governing Board of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The Hon. Minister for Lands and Natural Resources, Emmanuel Armah-Kofi Buah, in his capacity as the caretaker minister for Environment, Science, Technology and Innovation, officially swore in the 14-member EPA Board at

a ceremony held in Accra, on Tuesday, August 26, 2025.

He charged them to enforce the nation's environmental laws forcefully, citing their importance to the national economy.

He noted that the Board will play a crucial role in directing the agency's strategic direction and upholding its mandate, as specified by the Act 2025 (Act 1124).

The Acting Minister directed the Board's attention to key areas, beginning with the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) process and declared that the procedure was a vital protective measure, not a bureaucratic hurdle.

Mr. Buah emphasised that the effort to combat unlawful small-scale mining, or galamsey, was a shared responsibility for the new



Board and was connected to the legacy of the late former Minister.

“This menace, as you all know, is what our former minister and colleague ministers paid the ultimate price for; it is our collective responsibility as Board members to make sure we stay steadfast and committed to this and ensure that mining is done responsibly and sustainably in their memory,” he added.

In her remarks, the Chairperson of the Board, Dr. Christine Amoako-Nuamah, expressed commitment to deepening stakeholder engagement, fostering innovation and

expanding the Authority’s presence across all districts to strengthen grassroots environmental governance.

“I assure the government, partners and the general public of our dedication to advancing environmental sustainability as a key pillar of national development,” she added.

The aim was to assess these companies for product license renewal, evaluating compliance with regulations and operational readiness. The team conducted a thorough review of the companies' operations.

At Asomdwe Rubber Company Limited, which produces black polyethylene carrier bags, the team evaluated compliance with industry standards and readiness for license renewal.

Koforidua Office Visits Cement Building Block Factories in Akuapim North District to Enhance Safety Standards

The GSA Koforidua office, led by the Regional Manager, Mr. Andrew Larthey, recently visited cement building block factories in the Akuapim North District of the Eastern Region. The initiative, aimed at addressing the alarming rate of sudden building collapses across the country, focused on encouraging the factory to certify their products with the GSA to ensure compliance with national safety and quality standards.

During the visit, Mr. Larthey emphasised the critical need for certification under the GSA's regulatory framework, particularly the Manufacture of Cement Regulation, 2023 (LI 2480).

He highlighted that substandard building materials, including cement blocks, have been a major contributor to structural failures, posing severe risks to public safety. The GSA team educated factories' representatives on production processes and materials to identify areas for improvement and ensure adherence to established standards.

The engagement forms part of a broader effort by GSA to curb the proliferation of substandard construction materials, a concern heightened by recent incidents of building collapses.

Mr. Larthey stressed that certification would not only enhance product quality but also boost consumer confidence and protect lives and property.

The factory representatives welcomed the visit and expressed their willingness to align with GSA standards to contribute to safer construction practices.

The initiative aligns with GSA's ongoing campaigns to regulate the precast concrete industry and the enforcement of the National Building Code, aiming to mitigate risks in the construction sector.
